

OPEN SESSION

1. **Call to Order/ Pledge of Allegiance/ Roll Call/ Establishment of a Quorum.**

Commissioners Wetch, Gruwell, De Mars, Vice Chair Dr. Williams, and Chair Villegas attended in person. Commissioners Fiore and Hendrickson attended via video call.

2. **Welcome - Chairman's Opening Remarks.**

Chair Villegas thanked Commission staff and officials for another great year. Chair Villegas also thanked his fellow Commissioners and praised their passion for what they do.

3. **Review and Possible Action to approve the September 8, 2025, Commission Meeting Minutes.**

Commissioner Gruwell moved to approve the September 8, 2025, Commission meeting minutes.

*Commissioner Wetch **seconded the motion.***

No public comments.

Motion passed 6-0 by roll call vote.

4. **Review and Possible Action to approve the October 15, 2025, Commission Meeting Minutes.**

*Commissioner Gruwell **moved to approve the October 15, 2025, Commission meeting minutes.***

*Commissioner Fiore **seconded the motion.***

No public comment.

Motion passed 6-0 by roll call vote.

5. **Review and Possible action to approve the Proposed 2026 Commission meeting dates:**

*Commissioner Gruwell **moved to approve the proposed meeting dates.***

*Vice Chair Dr. Williams **seconded the motion.***

No public comment.

Motion passed 6-0 by roll call vote.

6. **Discussion and Possible Action regarding BKB Bare Knuckle Promotions Request for a Promoter license in order to hold events pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 4, section 533.**

EO Foster explained that he and Mel Valenzuela, BYB matchmaker, had been discussing the BKB Promotions ruleset and that BKB Promotions has agreed to the California rules that BKFC is currently abiding by. Because of this, EO Foster is recommending approval for one test event for BKB Promotions. They then must come back before the Commission for approval for full licensure pending the outcome of the test event.

BKB Promotions thanked the Commission for the opportunity and stated they are fully committed to bringing BKB Promotions to California.

Dr. Louis Durkin, president of the Association of Ringside Physicians, stated that the ARP's concerns were the length of rounds leading to increased injuries, but after examining the data they found that the laceration and concussion rates between two- and three-minute rounds were nearly identical. Dr. Durkin also explained that while the laceration rate in bareknuckle boxing was much higher than in boxing or MMA, the concussion rate was much lower.

Commissioner Gruwell had reservations about granting a license on at the meeting. He suggested that BKB Promotions allow the Commission to attend their events, look at how they regulate, and

make recommendations on how they would regulate in California and around the world. He would then recommend entering into a partnership to develop their ruleset. Chair Villegas explained that while the California Commission's priority is California, he hopes that the rest of the world would follow California's leadership

Commissioner Gruwell stated he would trust the Commission's doctors over a league doctor and that the California doctors had concerns when BKFC was initially asking for a license and that the only thing that made them come around was shortening the rounds to 2 minutes. He would feel more comfortable if BKB Promotions would allow the Commission to attend an event and see how they work and allow the Commission to show them how they run bareknuckle events in California.

Commissioner Dr. De Mars stated she does not have an issue with bareknuckle because as she understands it, they would be running events under the same ruleset as the bareknuckle events that have already been in California. She stated that although she has seen higher rate of lacerations in the bareknuckle fights that she has watched, but that there seemed to far fewer severe injuries. Commissioner Dr. De Mars explained that if people want to do it, and it's not any more dangerous than the sports already allowed, then it is difficult to vote against it.

George Gallegos with BKB Promotions explained that the reason why BKB Promotions wanted to come to California was because he wanted California to help shape the policy that would spread worldwide and help make the sport safer.

Commissioner Wetch stated that although he has confidence and respect for the Chair and Executive Officer, he is opposed to bareknuckle fighting.

Vice Chair Dr. Williams stated that he did not want people to conflate fewer concussions with increased safety. He explained that although a low number of concussions is a good thing, we also need to look at other injuries such as repetitive head injuries, intercranial bleeds, skull fractures, etc., that can also have an effect on the fighters' health. He also stated that a longer round may be something that represents more risk but is unsure on how to quantify that.

Michael Vazquez, owner of BKB Promotions, clarified that Dr. Durkin is not paid by BKB Promotions and that his report also includes data on other injuries such as bone and facial fractures. He is not opposed to 2 minutes rounds.

Commissioner Gruwell explained that he would be more comfortable if all bareknuckle promotions in California were following one unified ruleset.

*Commissioner Dr. De Mars **motioned** to approve BKB Promotions' request for a temporary Promoters license to allow them to hold one event using BKB rules as part of a pilot program. BKB Promotions will work with the Commission to establish a comprehensive regulatory framework, and BKB Promotions agrees to reimburse the Commission for any fees incurred in establishing this framework. BKB Promotions agrees to 2-minute rounds, enhanced drug tests, additional lab requirements for fighters, the ABC Unified Rules of Bare Knuckle, and a stitch doctor on site. After the conclusion of the one event the Executive Officer is to provide a report to the Commission on the event held, and the Executive Officer has the option to then approve BKB Promotions to hold three additional events using BKB rules.*

*Vice Chair Dr. Williams **seconded** the motion.*

Public Comments

Roy Engelbrecht praised the BKB Promotions team.

Motion passed 5-1 by roll call vote.

7. **Discussion and Possible Action regarding California State Championship Determination of the January 16, 2026, Jorge Chavez vs. Manny Flores Super Bantamweight contest at 122 pounds pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 4, section 384.**

EO Foster explained that it might have been over 20 years since the Commission has awarded the California State Championship belt. He explained that both of these boxers are great fighters and that this bout is a great way to reintroduce the Championship.

Chair Villegas credited Commissioner Fiore for the idea and thanked him for his work with EO Foster.

Commissioner Wetch moved to approve the California State Championship bout on January 16, 2026, at 122 pounds.

Commissioner Gruwell seconded the motion.

No public comment

Motion passed 6-0 by roll call vote.

8. **Discussion and Possible Action on Petition to Change the Decision for the Chase Whitmer vs Brandon Carrillo bout on October 10, 2025, in Long Beach, CA.**

EO Foster explained that this bout was Vladimir Matyushenko's first bout as a licensed referee with the Commission and that he was trying to do his job to protect the fighters.

Mr. Matyushenko explained that in the first round both fighters exchanged substantial blows. When the fighters had entered into the rear naked choke they had turned away from him and there was no way for him to determine if Mr. Carrillo was still conscious. Mr. Matyushenko explained that he didn't pull the fighter's hand and say, "stop the fight," he just touched his hand to determine if he was still conscious. He stated his concern was the length of the choke after exchanging heavy blows in the first round.

Commissioner Wetch stated that it appears that both fighters misunderstood what Mr. Matyushenko was doing and stopped fighting, but that the fight should have been restarted afterward.

Mr. Whitmer agreed that Mr. Matyushenko was trying to protect his opponent but remembers a hand touching him while he was choking his opponent and thought that was because the referee wanted to stop the fight. Mr. Whitmer felt the fight was headed toward a submission but trusts that the referee may have seen something that people on the outside weren't able to see.

Commissioner Gruwell wanted to make sure that the decision made by the Commission does not lead to fighters to continue fighting after a referee stops a bout. He would like to maintain the trust between fighters and officials.

EO Foster initially thought the fight should be a no contest due to circumstances but did not think the fight was going to get much better.

Commissioner Dr. De Mars agrees that it appeared that Mr. Whitmer was winning the fight, but that there was still a possibility that the fight could have turned around. Commissioner Dr. De Mars stated that Mr. Carrillo was not allowed to tap and that it was unfair to him, but if the fighters believed the fight was being stopped, they reacted appropriately.

Commissioner Dr. De Mars moved to change the decision to a no contest.

No Commissioner seconded the motion.

Motion did not carry.

9. **Discussion and Possible Action on Petition to Change the Decision for the Steven Navarro vs Jesse Mendoza bout on November 21, 2025, in Long Beach, CA.**

EO Foster explained that referee Tom Taylor followed the California ruleset exactly. EO Foster described the 2014 bout that cause the Commission to create the policy that allows the cutman the full 60 second rest period to treat the cut, immediately call time at the start of the round, and allow the doctor to examine the fighter. In California, the fight goes to the scorecards if the doctor stops the fight at the start of the 4th round. In the ABC Unified Rules, the fight must have completed 4 rounds.

EO Foster explained that the officials followed the California rules exactly as they should.

Liza Brereton, Mr. Navarro's attorney, spoke on behalf of Mr. Navarro and explained that there is no explicit rule in the California ruleset that states that referees are not to interrupt the break and that there was no conduct in the 4th round that would change the outcome of the 3 rounds prior. Ms. Brereton explained that Mr. Navarro was dominating the 3rd round and the fight was turning around in his favor in the 3rd round.

EO Foster explained that because the California Rules require judges to score the stopped fight at the beginning of the 4th round, it caused Mr. Navarro to lose. He stated that the rule has come back to bite the Commission, and it is up to the Commission to determine whether they want to keep that policy.

Ms. Brereton stated that in the video you can hear referee Tom Taylor tell the fighter that he is stopping the fight before the ringside physician had an opportunity to examine him. Referee Tom Taylor explained that when he is refereeing, he allows the corner to attempt to improve the fighter's cuts. Sometimes he sees improvement and sometimes he does not. In Mr. Navarro's case, he saw the cut at the beginning of the round and told the ringside physician that there had been no improvement and that he would likely have to end the fight, but the doctor examined Mr. Navarro and ended the fight himself.

Commissioner Wetch says that while this may be a rule that needs to be revisited, he has an issue with the precedent it may set if the Commission goes back and changes the decision.

Vishare Mooney, Manager to Mr. Navarro, stated that the California rule is unfair. She believes that a no contest or draw is the appropriate decision for this fight.

Mr. Navarro asked the Commission to rule the fight a no contest.

No action was taken. The decision stands.

10. Discussion and Possible Action regarding the October 30, 2025, USA Boxing letter sent to all USA Boxing Members about the USA Boxing policy regarding participation in events not sanctioned by USA Boxing.

EO Foster explained that USA Boxing sent members an email that stated if they were to work with other groups also delegated by the Commission that they could no longer participate in USA Boxing events. EO Foster stated that he believed that to be harsh especially since there are many boxers who are also kickboxers. He agreed with USA Boxing's stance if members were participating in point boxing, but that banning them from participating in kickboxing is too far. He noted that the Commission received a lot of feedback regarding USA Boxing's email.

Chair Villegas stated that there are no laws that ban fighters from participating in other combat sports. He explained an email preventing that is against what the Commission works for and that any communication regarding another organization should have come to the Commission first so that it can be discussed.

EO Foster explained that the email stated "events sanctioned by other organizations, etc." which could be taken to mean all organizations, but that only two were mentioned directly (ISKA, IKF)

Mike McAtee explained that the email was sent to USA Boxing members only, but not to the other organizations, and someone sent it to the other organizations. He explained that the health and safety of its members is the number one rule. Mr. McAtee explained that second concussion syndrome has caused 4 deaths in the US over the last two years and that is the reason why they adopted this new rule. He explained that there is no way for USA Boxing to know if a fighter fights in another sport in another state and gets knocked out.

Chair Villegas stated that the issue wasn't the rule but the way that it was communicated.

EO Foster explained that essentially amateur boxing events are Commission approved events regulated by USA Boxing as they are an approved delegation, same as ISKA or IKF. He noted that there is some contradictory language in the email sent by USA Boxing, namely the section that allows non athletes to participate in events sanctioned by the state commissions. EO Foster argued that ISKA and IKF are state sanctioned events. EO Foster stated that the issue with fighters is trickier because there is no national database for USA Boxing to see a suspension list.

Mr. McAtee explained that if a fighter is concussed, they are contacted by the gym themselves to report it. USA Boxing will be requiring certification of coaches and mandatory reporting of fighter injury. Commissioner Wetch asked why the requirement to self-report an injury is not extended to participation in other sports. Mr. McAtee explained that with the number of participants they have it is impractical and that this rule will allow them to err on the side of caution.

Mr. McAtee explained that 2 of the 4 deaths the fighters were participating in another sport. One fighter was injured during a sparring session at an MMA gym and participated in a USA Boxing event. Their investigation showed that the fighter had participated in an MMA event a week before and did not report the injury.

Commissioner Gruwell asked why these issues were not brought up to the Commission at any of the previous Commission meetings. Mr. McAtee agreed that communication could be worked on and stated that he has asked any communication with the California LBCs be cc'd to the Commission. He explained that this rule has been in the rulebook he was given when he became president and has not changed.

Vice Chair Dr. Williams stated that although he does not disparage USA Boxing for trying to protect its participants, sometimes the concept of second concussion (or impact) syndrome is misunderstood or misapplied.

Commissioner Wetch stated that a rule that tells thousands of athletes that they cannot be members of USA Boxing if they want to pursue other interests is too hard lined. He feels it would be better to require members to disclose they are participating in other sports, so they know what questions they need to ask, rather than banning other sports outright.

EO Foster agreed with Commissioner Wetch and stated that he may have a different interpretation of the USA Boxing rules. He explained that the rule states that members cannot participate in "unsanctioned events" and argues again that ISKA and IKF could be considered sanctioned events. Mr. McAtee explained that the rule is under a different section of the rulebook and that the rulebook will be revised to make the first rule starting January 1st once approved by the board.

EO Foster suggested that USA Boxing use BoxRec as a database to keep track of records and suspensions of fighters. Mr McAtee explained that it was suggested to them back in 2013 and that they began using Match Tracker.

11. **Executive Officer's Report**

a. *Budget Update for the Support Fund, the Neurological Fund, Pension Program, and MMA Benefit Fund.*

Cyril Shah, investment manager from Raymond James, presented the Executive Overview for the Commission's pension fund.

EO Foster explained to the Commission that he has had several meetings with DCA and that they are concerned about the Commission's revenue. He explained that before COVID the Commission had over 2 million dollars in the support fund, but that during the pandemic they did not receive any assistance from the government, and that the Commission had to spend money on several lawsuits. EO Foster stated that although he doesn't believe it is needed, he has requested a \$200,000 loan just in case. He believes that the Commission will be able to bring in over \$1.2 million in the first half of 2026. EO Foster stated that Boxing revenue is down, and that bareknuckle has been making up that revenue.

b. *Update on the Specialty License Plate.*

The Commission is waiting to have the license plates tested by the CHP.

c. *Status Update of Delegated Entities*

- World Association of Kickboxing Organizations (WAKO)- Thomas Henniger: Mr. Henniger has submitted WAKO's initial quarterly report which can be found in the meeting materials.

d. Staffing update.

EO Foster explained that the Commission is still operating lean with 1 AGPA, 2 SSAs, 1 Chief Athletic Inspector, 1 Assistant Chief Athletic Inspector, and the Assistant Executive Officer.

e. Upcoming Event Schedule.

EO Foster noted that there were 7 upcoming events that weekend throughout California.

12. Public Comment on Items Not on the Agenda.

Mr. Clark proposed a new combat sport called Juego Todo. He explained that the sport combines Filipino martial arts and MMA and has been recognized by the Game and Amusement Board in the Philippines. Mr. Clark explained that in the first and second rounds fighters use padded sticks, and the third round is an MMA round. Mr. Clark added that ambassadors of the sport are holding workshops nationwide to help explain the sport.

Johnny Davis, founder of Point Kickboxing, suggested that USA Boxing take another look at Point Kickboxing. He explained that all their results and suspensions are added to BoxRec. He stated that he did not know why USA Boxing would mention them in their email to members. He suggested that at some point other sanctioning bodies be allowed to regulate amateur boxing as it would broaden access to other fighters and increase their chances of winning gold medals at the Olympics.

Rafael Mendoza shared his concern regarding the email sent by USA Boxing.






The members of the commission shall elect one of their number as the chair and another member as the vice-chair. The chair and vice-chair shall be elected at the first meeting of each calendar year or when a vacancy exists.

Background

United States Fight Leagues delegation was approved on September 10, 2014, since their approval they have had an ambulance at all of their events. United States Fight League events have a high safety track record; the number of events, injuries and suspensions are reported to the Commission in their quarterly report.

United States Fight League has provided a memo regarding ambulance usage at events and their emergency action protocol for the Commission to review.

Recommendation

I recommend that the Commission grant United States Fight League a waiver for the ambulance requirement at events that have less than twenty five bouts; the waiver should be granted on an annual basis with review and approval being completed at the first Commission meeting of each year.

Members of the California State Athletic Commission,

Thank you for allowing us to provide a platform for the youth of California to display their skills as result of hours of dedication, discipline, and support from their tribe. Since the United States Fight Leagues' (USFL) inception in 2014 we have had 5,390 competitor exposures with only 76 minor injuries. This was accomplished by the use age restricted techniques, no slamming, no head strikes and the use of head gear.

USFL events can have up to 25 bouts and to promote the sport aspect of youth development by competition, we ask that tournaments have no set bout limits. Like other Olympic sports such as wrestling, there will be a 10-minute gap in between each match for recovery.

All events are under the medical supervision of a doctor and with that in mind we would like to formally request the commission for a variance or modification to relax the ambulance requirement for the USFL. We request that the ambulance requirement be to the discretion of the lead official if the following is met:

The venue must be within a 30-minute transport time to meet the "medical golden hour" referring to the critical 60-minute window immediately following a traumatic injury or medical emergency.


The second criteria would be a 15–20-minute ambulance response time.

Youth athlete safety will always be at the forefront of our organization. We wound not request this modification of a waiver without considering all the factors and possible consequences. A secondary effect of the waiver will reduce the cost of hosting events significantly Incentivizing more promotions and competitions.

Background

Firepower Promotions was approved as a licensed mixed martial arts (MMA) promoter in May of 2021. Since receiving their promoter license, Firepower has conducted a total of 43 events and currently has three additional events listed on the Commission’s upcoming event schedule.

Tom Anderson, representing Firepower Promotions, is requesting Commission approval for a new ruleset referred to as “Modified MMA.” Under this proposal, the promoter intends to conduct a professional stand-up combat sport utilizing a defined striking only ruleset. The format eliminates traditional mixed martial arts components, including grappling, submissions, takedowns, and all ground fighting.

Firepower Promotions has submitted its proposed ruleset to the Commission for review and is seeking authorization to implement this ruleset in upcoming professional events.

Recommendation

I recommend that the Commission approve Firepower Promotions’ request and approve them hold three events using the submitted Modified MMA rules.

Proposal to: The California State Athletic Commission

Request for: Approval of “Modified MMA” as a Regulated Combat Sport Utilizing Modified Stand-Up Striking Rules

Submitted by: Tom Anderson, Firepower Promotions Inc.

Executive Summary:

This proposal respectfully requests approval from the California State Athletic Commission (CSAC) to regulate **Modified MMA**, a professional stand-up combat sport utilizing a defined striking-only ruleset that eliminates traditional mixed martial arts grappling, submissions, takedowns, and ground fighting.

Modified MMA is a stand-up striking discipline designed to reduce exposure to the highest-risk injury mechanisms present in Unified Rules Mixed Martial Arts, while maintaining clear, enforceable rules and existing medical safeguards.

What Modified MMA Is:

A professional stand-up combat sport

Conducted in a five-rope boxing ring

Uses 4oz gloves currently approved by CSAC

Features shorter rounds (3 minutes) and simplified officiating

What Modified MMA Is Not:

Modified MMA does not permit:

Takedowns, throws, trips, or slams

Ground grappling or positional fighting

Submissions, chokes, or joint locks

Kicks or knee strikes

Mounted or kneeling ground-and-pound

These prohibitions remove several of the primary contributors to catastrophic injury in MMA.

Athlete Safety Rationale:

Modified MMA was structured to eliminate or reduce:

Cervical spine compression and axial loading injuries

Choke-induced loss of consciousness

Prolonged, unanswered ground-and-pound

Obstructed referee and physician sightlines

All meaningful action occurs **upright, visible, and immediately stoppable.**

Medical Oversight:

Operates fully within **existing CSAC medical protocols.**

Utilizes established:

Pre-bout medical examinations

Ringside physician authority

Post-bout medical suspensions

Concussion and injury assessment procedures

No new or experimental medical standards are required.

Officiating and Enforcement:

Simplified ruleset improves referee clarity and consistency

Explicit anti-stalling provisions in the clinch

Referees instructed to intervene immediately when:

A fighter cannot intelligently defend

Balance or awareness is compromised

A knockdown sequence escalates

Why Commission Approval Matters:

Approval allows CSAC to:

Set the regulatory standard for this format at inception

Ensure athlete safety through proactive oversight

Prevent unregulated or unsanctioned alternatives

Maintain California's leadership in combat sports regulation

Commission Request:

The applicant respectfully requests that the California State Athletic Commission:

Approve **Modified MMA** as a regulated combat sport

Permit licensed promoters to conduct **Modified MMA** bouts under CSAC oversight

Apply existing CSAC medical and officiating protocols to this format

In Conclusion:

Modified MMA represents a measured, safety-focused evolution of stand-up combat sports. It removes the highest-risk injury mechanisms associated with MMA while preserving transparency, enforceability, and physician visibility.

Approval allows the Commission to regulate the activity responsibly, from the outset, in alignment with CSAC's athlete safety mission.

Appendix A: Modified MMA Rules Overview

1. Legal Striking Techniques

The following strikes are permitted while both fighters remain standing:

Closed-fist punches

Elbows

Spinning backfists

Superman punches

All strikes must target legal scoring areas. Strikes to the back of the head, spine, groin, or throat are prohibited.

2. Gloves

Fighters wear 4oz MMA-style gloves.

Gloves allow natural hand positioning while still providing padding and wrist support.

Gloves are inspected and approved by CSAC prior to competition.

3. Competition Area

Bouts take place in a 5-rope boxing ring.

The reduced diameter encourages engagement while limiting excessive movement.

The structure minimizes uncontrolled falls and provides clear sightlines for officials.

4. Clinch & Grappling Restrictions

No wrestling, takedowns, throws, trips, sweeps, or submissions are permitted

Clinch contact is limited to brief striking exchanges.

Over-under hooks, prolonged holding, or stalling result in:

Verbal warnings

Point deductions for repeated infractions

Referees will immediately break inactive clinches

5. Knockdowns & Standing Ground-and-Pound

If a fighter is knocked down:

The standing fighter may strike using the hands only while both feet remain on the floor.

No kneeling, mounting, or following an opponent to the ground.

Referees are instructed to intervene immediately if the downed fighter is unable to intelligently defend.

6. Bout Duration

Non-title bouts: 3 rounds × 3 minutes

Championship bouts: 5 rounds × 3 minutes

One-minute rest periods between rounds

7. No Draws

If a bout is scored a draw after regulation rounds:

One mandatory extra round is conducted

Judges score the extra round to determine a winner

Safety Comparison: Modified MMA vs. Unified MMA Rules

While **Modified MMA** is a full-contact professional combat sport, its structure presents a **lower overall injury risk profile than Unified MMA** due to the elimination of several high-risk elements.

1. No Takedowns, Throws, or Slams

Unified MMA permits:

High-amplitude takedowns

Cage slams

Scramble-driven falls

These actions are a major source of:

Head impact injuries

Cervical spine trauma

Shoulder and clavicle injuries

Modified MMA eliminates all takedowns and throws, keeping athletes upright and significantly reducing fall-related injuries.

2. No Submissions or Joint Locks

Unified MMA allows:

Chokes resulting in loss of consciousness

Joint locks causing ligament tears or dislocations

Modified MMA prohibits all submission techniques, eliminating these injury mechanisms entirely.

3. Limited Ground Exposure

In Unified MMA:

Fighters may absorb extended ground-and-pound from dominant top positions

Referees often have obstructed views during scrambles

In **Modified MMA**:

No ground grappling is allowed

Standing ground-and-pound is limited to brief, clearly visible moments

Referees maintain unobstructed sightlines and immediate stoppage authority

This significantly reduces prolonged, unanswered head trauma.

4. Upright-Only Engagement Improves Referee Intervention

Because all meaningful action occurs in a standing position:

Referees can identify distress faster

Stoppages occur earlier

Fewer strikes are absorbed after competitive balance is lost

5. No Leg Kicks or Knee Strikes

Unified MMA allows:

Repetitive leg kicks causing nerve damage and structural injury

Knee strikes generating high concussive force

Modified MMA prohibits leg kicks and knees, reducing cumulative lower-body damage and high-force vertical impacts.

6. Shorter Rounds Reduce Accumulated Trauma

Three-minute rounds:

Allow more frequent medical assessment

Reduce prolonged fatigue-related damage

Encourage earlier intervention by officials

7. Simplified Rule Enforcement

The absence of grappling exchanges, submission attempts, and positional complexity allows:

Appendix B: California State Athletic Commission Modified MMA – Regulatory Questions & Responses

This appendix addresses anticipated questions and concerns regarding the proposed **Modified MMA** ruleset and provides clarifying responses focused on athlete safety, officiating clarity, and regulatory compliance.

Q1: How does Modified MMA differ from Mixed Martial Arts regulated under the Unified Rules?

Response:

Modified MMA removes the defining components of MMA, including:

All takedowns, throws, trips, and slams

All ground grappling and positional fighting

All submission techniques, including chokes and joint locks

All knee strikes and leg kicks

All combat occurs in an upright, standing position within a traditional five-rope boxing ring. The absence of grappling, submissions, and ground positional dominance fundamentally differentiates **Modified MMA** from Unified MMA.

Q2: Why is Modified MMA not regulated as traditional boxing?

Response:

While **Modified MMA** utilizes a boxing ring and emphasizes stand-up striking, it differs from traditional boxing due to:

The use of 4oz gloves rather than 8oz–10oz gloves

The allowance of limited non-traditional strikes (e.g., elbows, spinning backfists)

Shorter round durations

These differences necessitate a distinct regulatory classification while still operating within established CSAC safety frameworks.

Q3: Why are elbow strikes permitted if athlete safety is a priority?

Response:

Elbow strikes are permitted only in upright positions and are prohibited against downed opponents. While elbows may increase the likelihood of superficial lacerations, they:

Generate less concussive force than kicks or knees

Are easily observable by referees

Do not involve rotational or high-velocity impacts common to knee or kick strikes

From a neurological injury perspective, upright elbow strikes present a lower long-term risk than many techniques allowed under Unified MMA rules.

Q4: Does the use of small gloves increase the risk of serious injury?

Response:

Modified MMA utilizes gloves already approved by CSAC for professional MMA competition. While smaller gloves may increase finish rates, they also:

Reduce prolonged cumulative head trauma caused by repeated padded strikes
Encourage earlier stoppages by referees
Shorten bouts through decisive outcomes
The ruleset's shorter rounds and lack of ground dominance further mitigate cumulative injury risk.

Q5: Why is standing ground-and-pound permitted?

Response:

Standing ground-and-pound in **Modified MMA** is intentionally limited and differs substantially from MMA ground-and-pound:

The standing fighter must maintain both feet on the canvas

No kneeling, mounting, or following an opponent to the ground is permitted

Referees maintain unobstructed sightlines at all times

This allows for immediate intervention and prevents prolonged exposure to unanswered strikes.

Q6: How does Modified MMA prevent prolonged clinching or stalling?

Response:

The rules explicitly prohibit stalling tactics:

Over-under hooks and prolonged holding are not permitted

Referees issue immediate verbal warnings

Repeated infractions result in point deductions

Inactive clinches are broken promptly

These measures ensure continuous engagement and clear enforcement standards.

Q7: Why is a five-rope boxing ring used instead of a cage or four-rope ring?

Response:

The five-rope boxing ring provides:

Enhanced containment compared to four-rope configurations

Reduced risk of fighters falling through or entangling in ropes

Immediate, unobstructed access for medical personnel

The ring is a familiar, commission-approved environment that supports visibility and rapid response.

Q8: How are knockdowns and defenseless fighters handled?

Response:

Referees are instructed to immediately stop the bout when:

A fighter cannot intelligently defend themselves

A fighter demonstrates loss of balance, awareness, or responsiveness

A knockdown sequence escalates rapidly

The simplified, upright-only ruleset allows referees to make faster and clearer stoppage decisions than in grappling-based contests.

Q9: Does the “no draws” rule incentivize reckless behavior?

Response:

The no-draw provision applies only if judges score a bout as a draw after regulation rounds. In such cases:

A single additional three-minute round is conducted

All standard medical oversight applies

Referees retain full stoppage authority

This provision ensures decisive outcomes while maintaining athlete safety.

Q10: How does Modified MMA reduce the risk of catastrophic injury compared to Unified MMA?

Response:

Modified MMA removes or limits the primary mechanisms associated with catastrophic injury in MMA, including:

High-amplitude takedowns and slams

Cervical spine compression during grappling

Prolonged ground-and-pound

Chokes resulting in loss of consciousness

All action occurs upright, visible, and immediately stoppable, significantly reducing exposure to these risks.

Q11: Are CSAC medical protocols fully applicable to Modified MMA?

Response:

Yes. **Modified MMA** operates entirely within existing CSAC medical and licensing frameworks, including:

Pre-bout medical examinations

Ringside physician oversight

Post-bout medical suspensions

Standard concussion and injury protocols

No new or untested medical procedures are required.

Q12: Why should the Commission approve Modified MMA?

Response:

Approval of **Modified MMA** allows the California State Athletic Commission to:

Proactively regulate an emerging combat sport format

Establish safety and officiating standards at the outset

Reduce the likelihood of unregulated or unsanctioned events

Advance CSAC’s mission of athlete safety and regulatory leadership

1. Overview of Injury Risk Philosophy

Modified MMA is designed to **remove or substantially limit the primary injury mechanisms associated with catastrophic outcomes in MMA**, while maintaining a controlled, observable striking environment.

The ruleset emphasizes:

Upright-only engagement

Elimination of grappling-related cervical and spinal stress

Reduced exposure to prolonged, unanswered head strikes

Immediate physician and referee visibility

2. Primary Injury Mechanisms Eliminated Compared to MMA

2.1 Cervical Spine and Axial Load Injuries

Unified MMA allows:

High-amplitude takedowns

Throws and slams

Scramble-induced falls

These mechanisms are associated with:

Cervical spine compression

Acute disc injury

Brachial plexus trauma

Modified MMA prohibits all takedowns, throws, and slams, keeping athletes upright and significantly reducing axial load risk.

2.2 Choke-Induced Loss of Consciousness

Unified MMA permits:

Carotid artery compression

Airway obstruction via submission holds

These techniques result in:

Transient cerebral hypoxia

Repeated loss-of-consciousness episodes over a career

Modified MMA eliminates all submission holds, removing this injury mechanism entirely.

2.3 Prolonged Ground-and-Pound

In MMA, extended ground control can result in:

Repeated, unanswered head strikes

Delayed referee stoppage due to obstructed sightlines

Increased cumulative concussive and subconcussive trauma

Modified MMA allows **only brief standing ground-and-pound**, with:

No kneeling, mounting, or positional dominance

Clear, unobstructed referee visibility

Immediate stoppage when intelligent defense is compromised

3. Striking Profile and Neurological Considerations

3.1 Allowed Strikes

Permitted techniques include:

Punches (closed fist)

Elbows

Spinning backfists

Superman punches

Notably prohibited:

Kicks of any kind

Knee strikes

Soccer kicks or stomps

Strikes from grounded positions

From a neurological standpoint:

Punches and elbows generate **less rotational acceleration** than kicks or knees

All strikes occur upright, reducing secondary head impact with the canvas

3.2 Glove Size and Cumulative Trauma

Adapted MMA utilizes 4oz gloves currently approved by CSAC for MMA.

Clinical considerations:

Smaller gloves may increase acute stoppage rates

Reduced padding can decrease prolonged high-volume head impact

Earlier knockdowns often result in earlier referee stoppage

This tradeoff may reduce **cumulative neurological exposure** compared to longer-duration, high-volume striking contests.

4. Knockdowns, Falls, and Secondary Impact Risk

4.1 Ring Environment

Bouts take place in a **five-rope boxing ring**, which provides:

Enhanced containment compared to four-rope rings

Reduced risk of fighters falling through ropes

Immediate access for ringside physicians

4.2 Knockdown Management

No following an opponent to the ground

Standing strikes only, with both feet on the canvas

Referees instructed to stop bouts immediately upon signs of neurologic compromise

This limits secondary head impact and reduces prolonged exposure after knockdowns.

5. Round Structure and Fatigue Management

Rounds are limited to 3 minutes

One-minute rest intervals

Championship bouts capped at 5 rounds

Shorter rounds:

Allow more frequent assessment of athlete condition

Reduce fatigue-induced defensive lapses

Improve physician ability to detect evolving neurologic symptoms

6. Lacerations and Superficial Injuries

The allowance of elbows may increase:

Facial lacerations

Periorbital cuts

However:

These injuries are typically superficial and immediately treatable

Ringside physician access is unobstructed

Lacerations are considered lower-risk than neurologic injury mechanisms

7. Referee and Physician Visibility

A core medical advantage of **Modified MMA** is continuous visual access:

No ground scrambles obscuring the athlete's face

No cage walls limiting physician perspective

Upright posture allows immediate recognition of:

Loss of balance

Delayed responses

Altered gait or posture

Visual tracking deficits

This facilitates earlier stoppages and quicker medical intervention.

8. Applicability of Existing CSAC Medical Protocols

Modified MMA operates fully within established CSAC frameworks, including:

Pre-bout medical examinations

Neuroimaging requirements where applicable

Ringside physician authority

Post-bout medical suspensions

Concussion protocols

No modifications to existing CSAC medical standards are required.

9. Medical Conclusion

From a physician safety perspective, **Modified MMA**:

Removes multiple high-risk injury mechanisms inherent to MMA

Limits prolonged head trauma exposure

Improves referee and physician visibility

Reduces the likelihood of catastrophic cervical and neurologic injury

While **Modified MMA** remains a full-contact combat sport with inherent risk, its design reflects a measurable reduction in catastrophic injury vectors compared to Unified MMA rules.







Background

AB 2130(Haney) is proposed legislation that will amend or add to the laws governing the California State Athletic Commission. These changes are designed to improve operations, strengthen oversight, and give the Commission clearer authority in key areas.

- 1. Sponsorship Contract Authority (New Section 18829)**
This part of the bill would give the Commission explicit authority to enter into sponsorship agreements. The purpose is to create an additional, sustainable funding stream so the boxers pension plan and MMA benefit plan remain viable and continue to provide long-term benefits to eligible athletes.
- 2. Assistant Chief Athletic Inspector in Charge of Training (Amended Section 18613)**
This change would formally create a new role within the inspector program: an Assistant Chief Inspector who is specifically responsible for training. The purpose is to improve consistency across events, strengthen inspector readiness, and ensure that training standards stay aligned with best practices in combat sports regulation.
- 3. Discretionary Payments From the MMA Fund (Amended Section 18888.5)**
This amendment would update the rules governing discretionary payments made from the Mixed Martial Arts benefit fund. The goal is to give the Commission clearer authority and more flexibility to issue payments to eligible athletes, while maintaining appropriate oversight of fund sustainability and administration.

Recommendation

I recommend the Commission support and sponsor Assemblymember Haney's bill, AB 2130, which addresses three key areas

1. Sponsorship Contract Authority.
2. Establishment of an Assistant Chief Athletic Inspector in Charge of Training.
3. Authorization of Discretionary Payments from the Mixed Martial Arts (MMA) Fund.

ASSEMBLY BILL

No. 2130

Introduced by Assembly Member Haney

February 18, 2026

An act to amend Sections 18613 and 18888.5 of, and to add Section 18829 to, the Business and Professions Code, relating to professions and vocations, and making an appropriation therefor.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2130, as introduced, Haney. State Athletic Commission: boxing and mixed martial arts: sponsorship contracts.

Existing law, the Boxing Act, also known as the State Athletic Commission Act, creates the State Athletic Commission and makes the commission responsible for licensing and regulating, among other sports, boxing and martial arts, including mixed martial arts. Existing law prohibits a person from engaging in the promotion of, or participating in, a boxing or martial arts contest, match, or exhibition without a license, except as specified.

Existing law requires the commission to appoint a person exempt from civil service to serve as the executive officer to exercise the powers and perform the duties delegated by the commission. Existing law authorizes the commission to employ certain individuals to perform specified duties.

This bill would authorize the commission to employ an assistant chief athletic inspector in charge of training to assist the chief athletic inspector in exercising the above-described duties.

Existing law establishes the Athletic Commission Fund and requires that all moneys received by the commission under these provisions be remitted to the Treasurer and deposited into that fund. Existing law

establishes the Boxers' Pension Fund (BP Fund) and Mixed Martial Arts Retirement Benefit Fund (MMA Fund), and requires that certain amounts be contributed to those funds, as specified. Existing law makes those funds continuously appropriated and provides that amounts in the funds are to be used exclusively for the purposes and administration of those funds. Existing law makes a violation of these provisions a misdemeanor.

This bill would authorize the commission to enter into a contract or agreement with specified entities to place the entity's name, logo, insignia, or brand on the apparel of certain individuals, including referees, as specified. The bill would prohibit a sponsorship contract from, among other things, promoting a sham or fake contest, as specified.

This bill would require 25% of the payment received under these contracts to be deposited into the Athletic Commission Fund to be used as prescribed and, notwithstanding the above-described deposit requirement, the remaining 75% of the payment received to be divided between the BP Fund and MMA Fund in a manner that fairly represents the revenue derived from each segment, as determined by the commission and set forth in the sponsorship contract. By depositing the above-described payments into the continuously appropriated funds, the bill would make an appropriation.

This bill would authorize the commission to adopt regulations for the implementation of these provisions. The bill would declare that, notwithstanding existing law, a violation of these provisions is not a crime.

Existing law entitles a martial artist who has vested in the MMA Fund, as prescribed, to specified distributions of amounts held in the martial artist's regular account, as defined, to be made from the MMA Fund.

This bill would authorize the commission to, upon a determination that the balance of the MMA Fund sufficiently exceeds the amount needed for anticipated future payments, make a one-time payment from the proceeds of sponsorship contracts in the MMA Fund to those individuals who would have met the January 1, 2026, MMA Fund vesting requirements if the vesting requirements had been established on January 1, 2006. By authorizing new uses of a continuously appropriated fund, this bill would make an appropriation.

This bill would make legislative findings and declarations related to the furtherance of a public purpose.

Vote: $\frac{2}{3}$. Appropriation: yes. Fiscal committee: yes.







Reinvestments of dividend or capital gain distributions are excluded from Amount Invested but are included in Total Cost Basis. 1. CAMO SAFETY AND SUSPENSION REPORT:

We are pleased to report that there have been no injuries of heightened concern since the last CAMO report on December 12, 2025. This is a testament to our collective focus on athlete safety. Attached please find our injury and suspension list for your review (Exhibit 1).

2. FINANCIAL REPORT:

CAMO's reserve accounts continue to maintain appropriate levels following the seasonal slowdown we experience annually during the holiday season. We remain within all recommended financial ranges.

3. 2026 AT A GLANCE




